"Issues are not as important as treatment of issues--style as you say."

"Most of my campaigning is one on one. It's very hard to get people to sit down in groups to be assaulted by a politician. My district is a typical suburban district in a frenzy. Susie has to be taken to her piano lesson, mom is off to sing in the choir, dad's on a business trip. You can't find them in groups, so you have to get them one on one."

"I told him I picked him because I wanted a suburban district. You've got it. It's almost completely suburban--except for 10,000 core city people. That doesn't amount to much when you compare it to 450,000. But they are really suburban too. They are the white end of an area being encroached upon by black. And they think more suburban than the people in the suburbs."

Re census. "I don't think they do such a good job in our districts. It's as mobile as the city. One third of the district turns over every couple of years. And there's a lot of double job holding. They go bowling at night and fishing on weekends. So nobody's home most of the time."

"I can't find the indians the census bureau says I have. They say I have several hundred blacks. I find eight."
